- **Read together.**


Dirty Jobs

At what age do people usually start working in your country? At what age do people retire?

Does your native country have a minimum wage?

In America, a full-time job is usually 40 hours per week. Do people work more hours per week in America or in your native country?

In the U.S., there are laws about hiring and firing that protect workers from discrimination (based on race, religion, gender, age, or disabilities.) Are there similar laws in your native country? Explain.
